What I should already know

- **Key Dates**Most castles were built between 500 and 1000 years ago (1066 1500).
- Big stone castles (concentric castles) were built from 1277 (about 700 years ago).
- Windsor Castle was first build in 1070, but was altered over the years. It looks different now.

Key Knowledge

When and why were castles built?

Castles were often built **on top of hills**. This was the first line of defence. It was hard for an attacking army to get up the hill.

Key Knowledge

Castles were built to **protect people** from invaders/enemies attacking them.





<u>Castle features</u> – Castles often had a **moat**, **drawbridge**, **portcullis**, **thick walls with battlements**, **arrow loops**, **murder holes**, **towers and turrets**.

Who lives in a castle now? Windsor Castle is one of the Queen's/King's homes.



Castle Rooms – Castles often had a keep, a hall, bedrooms, kitchen, knights' quarters, armoury, prison/dungeon, granary.

People/Jobs in a Castle

Royals/Lords – These people owned the castles, and other people did jobs for them.

Knights were soldiers. They rode on horses. They wore armour to protect them. They had shield and swords. They competed in jousting competitions for entertainment.

Squires were assistants to knights. They looked after the horses and the knights' equipment. A squire became a knight when he was about 21.



Other jobs – gong farmer, jester, cook.

Castle a large building with thick walls, battlements, towers, and in many cases a Arrow slit or a narrow vertical slit in a wall for shooting arrow loop or looking through Moat a deep, wide ditch surrounding a castle, often filled with water **Portcullis** A strong gate lowered to block the entrance to the castle A bridge over a moat that can be raised or Drawbridge lowered A wall around the top of the castle with cut-**Battlements** outs (looks like teeth) A tall, narrow building (or part of a building) Tower starting at the ground Turret A small tower in top of a larger tower or building A strong tower inside the wall. The last line Keep of defence. King Male ruler of a land Queen Female ruler of a land or a king's wife Knight A soldier hundreds of years ago A person who cleaned up poo Gong farmer Cook A person who cooks food Jester A joker, who entertained people long ago. Squire A knight's assistant Garderobe A toilet in a castle Murder Holes in the castle, used to drop stones or Holes hot tar on enemies


Timeline of events
