### What is special about the North and South Pole?

The North Pole is as far north as you can travel on Earth. It is in the Arctic Circle. The Arctic Circle is made up of eight countries.

The South Pole is as far south as you can travel on Earth. It is in the continent of Antarctica.

#### Do people live in the Arctic Circle and Antarctica?

Yes and no. Most people who live in the Arctic Circle live in Canada. They are called 'Inuit'.

There are no indigenous inhabitants in Antarctica. But over 1000 scientists and researchers stay there to learn more about them.

#### How can the Arctic Circle and Antarctica be called deserts?

Deserts are dry places where there is little or no rainfall each year. It is so cold in the Arctic Circle and Antarctica that is does not rain much.
